 - 1. How would you pay for it? We are to be good stewards, not going beyond our means (1 Cor 4:1-2).
 - 2. How would the choice affect my life? Seek God's kingdom first (Matt 6:33).
- iii. Gather data from others: What do my parents, pastors, and/or friends think, someone who will tell me what I need to hear not necessarily what I want to hear (**Prov 11:14; 12:15; 13:10; 19:20; 24:6**)?
- iv. After you apply specific verses and biblical principles, the decision will often be made. What if you are left between two biblical alternatives?

- i. This is the promise of Ps 37:4: Delight yourself in the Lord; and He will give you the desires of your heart.
 - 1. This does not mean that when you "delight in the Lord," then you can get what you want.
 - 2. It means that when you are following specific verses and biblical principles, you are in that moment delighting in the Lord.
 - 3. And when you are "delighting in the Lord," he will make your desires to be his desires.

4. Summary

- a. Perform the specific verses of God's revealed will in Scripture to the best of your ability.
- b. Apply biblical principles to the decision. Don't rely on open doors, circumstances, results, feelings, or fleeces.
- c. If you are still left with a decision, and *only* after you are doing steps 1 and 2, do what you really want. God will make his desires your desires.
